aediles	junior magistrates in charge of maintaining water supply, streets and buildings, markets, games and festivals
alae	rooms with images of family ancestors
alba	white tablets on which political notices were inscribed
amphitheatre	an oval-shaped, open- air area surrounded by seating

amphora	a large pottery container, often used for olive oil and wine
anthropogenic	from human causes
apse	a semi-circular vaulted recess at the end of a building
atrium	an entrance hall
Augustalis	a priest involved in emperor worship

basilica	a building, usually large and impressive, where law courts were held
bas-relief	a sculpture or carving with some parts projecting out from the background
carbonise	to convert into carbon as in the timber doors and beams in Herculaneum
colonnade	a row of columns
comitium	a voting assembly

compluvium	an opening in the roof to let in light and air
concord	harmony
cubicula	a bedroom
cursus honorum	Roman career path of political offices which had to be held in a particular order
debris	scattered broken pieces or rubbish left behind

deities	gods and goddesses
dendrochronology	the dating of timber by counting the growth rings in trees
disarticulated	disconnected
duoviri	senior magistrates in charge of the administration of justice through the courts, council meetings and public finance
